Noise: A Human History

Travelling across the world to hunt down unusual stories of sound, Professor David Hendy takes us from prehistory to the present, encompassing the shamanistic music of our cave-dwelling ancestors, the massacre of noisy cats in pre-revolutionary Paris, the nerve-destroying din of trench warfare, right through to the cacophony of the modern metropolis.

This is sound as life and death, pleasure and pain, power and revolution.

Noise - A Human History of Sound and Listening was a 30-part series on BBC Radio 4 exploring how our interactions with sound have shaped us over 100,000 years.

About Professor David Hendy

David is a media historian interested very broadly in the role of sound, images, and communication in human cultures across time. He's especially interested in the role of modern 'mass' media - radio, the press, cinema, television, the internet - in shaping popular life and thought in the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries. David has written and presented programmes on BBC Radio 3 and 4 about broadcasting history, culture, and media. He also wrote Life on Air: a History of Radio Four, which won the Longmans-History Today Book of the Year award in 2008.

This will be an informative and stimulating talk – not just about the background to the writing of the book and the making of the BBC series – but about the ways in which sounds shape popular life and thought.
