Course outline

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Learning outcomes:

By the end of the unit students will required to demonstrate that they can:

- 1. interpret the display and use of objects in museums in terms of their historical and social function
- 2. design and undertake self-directed learning tasks in a museum context
- 3. use a wide range of museum learning resources

Week 1

Outcomes: 1,2.

Focus: museum history and issues

- 1. Students are introduced to:
 - the structure and content of course
 - assessment tasks and criteria
- 2. Students articulate their current conceptions of museums and explore various alternative conceptions, both past and present.

Out of class tasks: Visit a local museum and analyse what it is for

Reading: Review of theatre and performance galleries, V&A,

Bring in something they collect to talk about next lesson

Week 2

Outcomes: 1, 3, 4. Focus: Collections

- 1. Students present and discuss various local museums in the context of topics of week 1 and the reading.
- 2. Students compare different motivations for making and displaying collections, and different ways in which collections are ordered.

Out of class task: Reading: 'Pieces of Me' from Guardian, A.S. Byatt, excerpt from 'The Biographer's Tale', 'Collecting Reconsidered' (S Pearce, from 'Interpreting Objects and Collections').

Week 3

Outcomes: 1, 2, 4.

1. Students explore the V&A building and a selection of galleries in the context of issues surrounding museums and collections covered in previous lessons.

Out of class task: Students prepare a presentation based on the V&A visit. Students investigate one V&A web resource.

Week 4

Outcomes: 1, 2, 3, 4. Focus: collections

- 1. Students give presentations based on V&A visit and web resources.
- 2. Students feed back on readings discussed in Lesson 2. Students talk to Morna Hinton and Lucy Trench via videoconferencing about the British Galleries and labelling in the V&A respectively.

Out of class task: Students write a short report on how they think the V&A actual and virtual resources could support their practice.

Students bring in a 'Piece of them' for next lesson, and research it in preparation for writing a label next lesson.

Week 5

Outcomes: 1, 2, 3, 4.

Focus: objects

- 1. Students explore different aspects of objects which can be brought out by different exhibitions
- 2. Students discuss different labels (using V&A text guidelines) and write a label for the object they brought to class.

Out of class task: Students start preparation of final assessment project.

Readings: 'Not looking at kettles' (Ray Bachelor) from

'Interpreting Objects and Collections' and 'Teaching yourself to teach with objects' (John Hennigar Shuh) from 'The Educational Role of the Museum' (Hooper-Greenhill).

Week 6

Outcomes: 2, 3, 4.

1. Students have a Behind the Scenes tour of the V&A textiles department and visit the National Archives of Art and Design at Olympia.

Out of class task: Continue preparation of final assessment project

Students add to their report on how the V&A can support their practice, taking archives into account

Students complete a sheet analysing how their perception of the same object changes when it is put in six different positions (on the floor, on a table in the café, on the reception desk, in the Grand Parade gallery etc).

Week 7

Outcomes: 2, 3, 4. Focus: the visitor

- 1. Students feed back on the readings from week 5 and add to aspects of objects which can be brought out through different questions and displays.
- 2. Students feed back on homework from week 6.
- 2. Students interview course tutors on their learning preferences in museums.
- 3. Students discuss first draft of their final assessment project.

Out of class task: Make notes in response to a questionnaire on their learning preferences in museums.

Continue preparation of final assessment project

Week 8

Outcomes: 1, 2, 3.

- 1. Students feed back on responses to the questionnaire on their learning preferences.
- 2. Students take part in group tutorials with course tutor(s)

Out of class task: Complete final assessment project.

Week 9

Outcomes: 1,2,3

- 1. Students give a presentation of the final assessment task.
- 2. Students fill in a course feedback form.
